Dear Residents, Family Members and Friends,



This weekly newsletter is being sent to family members listed as the primary contact for each resident. Please feel free to share this information with others. Last week I focused on discussing COVID-19 testing for staff and residents. I have some updates since last week's newsletter. Last week we were waiting for the results of the resident and staff test results for the Baldwin Care Center. When I left off at the end of last week, we had received approximately 40% of the test results. We ended up receiving 34 test results back. This was a combination of residents and staff test results. The good news is that all of those test results were negative. However the remaining 71 tests were not kept at the proper temperature at the lab and came back with a result that indicated they were "Unacceptable". This was not due to any error on the part of the Baldwin Care Center. We will have to order more test kits. We will be planning a re-test date for all residents and staff. Since this test is a particular snapshot in time, we would like to re-test everyone to see where we are facility-wide on a particular date. Please accept my sincere apologies for the inconvenience that this may cause, particularly for residents. Even though the test was the simple nasal swab, it was still a little bit troubling to some of the residents, particularly those who may have a dementia diagnosis. What is troubling to me is that the criteria for reopening nursing facilities in the future hinges on weekly testing. Facilities must continue to have negative test results for residents and staff for 28 days before we can even begin opening up somewhat. If we do have a positive result, we must start the process over with the time frame for reopening extended. I am not trying to sound pessimistic, I am merely reporting what the status is regarding testing. The processes at the lab need to be improved significantly so that more regular testing can become possible.

The staff and resident COVID-19 testing at Birch Haven Assisted Living and Birchwood Apartments was completed on Tuesday, May 26th. The courier picked up the tests on mid afternoon on Wednesday. They were then transported to the lab in Madison. The turnaround time for receiving test results is supposed to be 72 hours. This means we should have gotten results on Saturday or Sunday. None were received. I spent most of Monday morning on the phone with Exact Sciences Lab attempting to fix my electronic access to get all of the final results for the Baldwin Care Center. I was trying to access the results for Birch Haven also. I finally found out that the same site administrator cannot access results from two different buildings, even if they are on the same campus. This process has been incredibly frustrating thus far. I will keep you updated regarding the process and, of course, regarding the results. If any of the tests are positive for staff or residents, the facility will be contacting residents and responsible parties within 12 hours of when we are notified. The two staff members that tested positive for COVID-19 in Birch Haven Assisted Living are recovering at home quite quickly. We anticipate that they will be returning to work by the end of this week.



The Baldwin Care Center campus held graduation recognition ceremony for the eight seniors that work on the campus. The photos for the majority of the seniors appeared in last week's newsletter. The weather was a little cooler and it was windier than we would have preferred, but we made the best of it. Two area newspapers were here and covered the story, so hopefully there will be some photos in the local newspapers. We

will be posting photos on our Facebook page and will include some in this newsletter. Pomp and Circumstance was played as the seniors took their position to receive their recognition awards and gift bag from the staff and residents of the Baldwin Care Center. The gift bag included some essentials for this pandemic time including some toilet paper and a mask, in addition to some monogrammed towels with the student's school colors on them, some useful items from Bath and Body Works and some cash. The residents held up personalized signs for all of the graduates while everyone cheered as their names were called! The students and family members who attended seemed very appreciative of the recognition. We topped the recognition off with some cake and refreshments after a brief graduation speech from the Administrator. This is a very uncertain time for everyone, especially for our graduates. We wish them the best in their

future endeavors. We know they will succeed. We see their caring, compassionate spirit through their work here with the seniors on the campus. These traits will take them far. Congratulations Graduates!
